# A YEAR OF GROWTH

We are immensely proud of the outcomes we have achieved in only our second year of operation. We have continued to provide ongoing support in assisting young Tanzanian women develop and learn new skills that will empower and support them in creating successful futures for themselves.

At the start of 2021 we regrouped as an organisation to fix our focus on realising our vision and mission. The importance of our mission has been brought to the fore during the pandemic, when across the globe people have been impacted and seen their lives changed and challenged. With 28% of Tanzanians living below the poverty line, and an expected increase to this of approximately 600,000 people due to the ramifications of the COVID pandemic, the work we are doing is more important now than ever.

In response to this, we have concentrated our efforts over these last 12 months on providing ongoing support to our very worthy 'sister' – the Inuka Tusonge Foundation. We say 'sister' in the organisational sense because our goals, visions and mission are very closely aligned.

We started our support for this amazing foundation in our inaugural year and the impact of our financial support has been rewarding to witness. The amazing efforts of Beatrice and her team are resulting in immediately visible and tangible outcomes that completely align with all we hope to achieve through our own organisation: further education, upskilling and empowerment of young Tanzanians - with a focus firmly on girls and women. We hope that our assistance will enable them to sustainably develop themselves into independent, successful business owners in the future.

We are especially thankful for the generosity of our donors and their contributions over the past year. This has been a very difficult time for many. The continuation of the global pandemic has presented opportunities for innovative and creative fundraising techniques to collect much-needed funds for those in Tanzania. The amazing efforts of Director Dianna Snape in donating and raffling more of her limitededition 'Lines and Tangles' prints has been a major source of our fundraising throughout the year. Hopefully, we can capitalise on the momentum of our donations having increased fourfold, a truly astonishing feat given the COVID circumstances.

# CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

The perseverance of our organisation has contributed to a year filled with highlights. One shining example of our achievements for the past year was Lilian Kagaruki's graduation. Lilian successfully completed a tour guiding course in 2020 and followed up with participation in two field group studies. Her three-month work placement began in March 2021 in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area. Lilian gave a presentation to the women at Inuka Tusonge, offering an important example of how it's possible to improve one's socioeconomic status despite financial challenges, as well as offering friendship, mentoring and confidence to the students.

Our ongoing financial support to Inuka Tusonge has been used to pay rent and wages for our facilitators and we are thankful for their incredible efforts in coordinating and providing classes for the 15 motivated young women. The generosity of our donors has allowed our funds to be extended further to assist with equipment purchases for the centre, such as an oven, computer, four sewing machines and many other teaching supplies essential for the education of these women.

Inuka Tusonge's course, overseen by Beatrice, offers a vocational experience for young women to be equipped with practical skills that will sustain them in their future years – similar to a technical college experience offered in Australia.

The practical skills imparted have extended to cover a number of different trades including tailoring, cooking, hairdressing and beauty therapy, each delivered by skilled facilitators. Accompanying these training sessions are guest presentations by community leaders to impart their knowledge to the students. A few examples have been Sakina – a professional food nutritionist - who volunteered her time to increase awareness of the importance of eating the right foods, a very important issue for several young mothers who were present. Martha Mbwambo gave a motivational talk on her growth from a poor child who failed to finish primary school to become a motivational speaker after being taught entrepreneurship and baking by her boss. These talks have motivated many of the young women to pursue a holistic education and given them the confidence to pursue all opportunities that are presented.

The foundation has also established its own vegetable garden where the girls are learning to cultivate the vegetables as well as about food preparation, cooking and baking. These are practical courses that together provide both immediate and long-term benefits to the students and their families.

# CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

A future focus for both of our organisations is to extend these courses to include additional tuition to teach skills that further the empowerment of young girls. These skills include English language, an understanding of entrepreneurship through business plan writing, provided together with genderappropriate education on HIV/AIDS and safe sex, as well as a course on alcohol and drug abuse prevention. These are all critical in building a better society. One of Nina Imani's missions is to fuel economic empowerment by providing capital for small business initiatives and study to vulnerable Tanzanians. The ability of these young women to learn how to manage their own business is the focus of our charity and will continue to be into the next financial year.

The enrolment forms signed when women join Inuka Tusonge outline the foundation's rules and expectations and embody the moral code of the foundation. The foundation instils a great respect for ethics and hard work from which the young women can build a future for themselves and Tanzania. Given that our charity name Nina Imani is Swahili for 'I have confidence' and it is the confidence we hope to instil in those we support, this further supports the close values we share with this wonderful foundation.

We hope that the next year will see the world learn to live safely with the pandemic and will open more doors to further support the emergence of young, capable women in Tanzania.

# WHY WE DO THIS

Education and basic economic security should be a human right. All human beings need a sense of security, a sense of belonging, a sense of stability and a sense of direction.

- 85.3% of total employment in Tanzania is self-employment [2]. In Tanzania, the systemic failure of education has contributed to individuals remaining self-employed or under-utilised.
- Only 7% of the population are employed in the formal sector and get paid regularly. [3],
- Tanzania has achieved approximate gender parity in primary level education, but at secondary level girls are under-represented. Just over one in four Tanzanian girls goes on to complete their secondary education with the gap widening further at the tertiary level. [4]
- Tanzanian small business enterprises face several constraints such as limited capital, poor market accessibility, low entrepreneurial knowledge and a bureaucracy that hinders their growth. [5]
- 28% of Tanzanians are living below the poverty line, with an expected increase of 600,000 people due to the ramifications of the COVID pandemic on the economy. [6]

# HOW WE DO THIS

### Supporting the Inuka Tusonge Foundation

### Inuka Tusonge is Swahili for 'Stand up and move forward'.

This concept, underpinned by shoring up empowerment and independence, is ultimately what lies at the heart of Nina Imani's ongoing partnership with the Inuka Tusonge Foundation.

The Inuka Tusonge Foundation was founded January 2020 by three tertiary-educated Tanzanian women who identified a gap in education provision for vulnerable women and girls in their community. With financial assistance from a local women's organisation, the Inuka Tusonge Foundation opened a vocational training centre in Arumeru District. Managed by Beatrice Lyimo, a founding director of Inuka Tusonge, the primary aim of the centre is to create new opportunities for Tanzanian women and girls who lack formal education to acquire valuable life skills and improve their overall employability.

Thanks to ongoing financial support from Nina Imani, Inuka Tusonge's vocational centre is able to provide skills-based training in areas such as hairdressing and beauty services, baking, tailoring and vegetable cultivation. Supplementary education aims to foster entrepreneurial potential and build individual capacity by developing English-language skills, broader personal and social competencies, as well as business planning and employability skills.

Each program runs for six months, and upon graduation students are invited to participate in further mentoring. Designed to help graduates transition from the classroom to the workforce, the Inuka Tusonge Foundation's mentoring program helps former students identify how their new skills might be utilised to secure their future financial independence and security.


### **Study Grants**

In 2020 we funded a study grant for Lilian Kagaruki to undertake a part-time, 12-month tour guiding course at Sila College in Arusha to improve her opportunities to generate work and income. This funding included important basics such as tuition, uniforms, books and safe transport to and from college.

From March to June 2021, Lilian completed a three-month unpaid work placement in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area as part of her course at Sila College. Nina Imani funded Lilian's costs during work placement including a small monthly stipend so she could continue her support for her family through this life transition.

Lilian's final exams were held in July (delayed due to COVID) and results are expected to be announced in October. In the meantime, with the support of Nina Imani, Lilian has enrolled in a six-month hotel course to improve her employment opportunities in the Arusha region.

We look forward to celebrating the new opportunities that this course, and Lilian's growing network, will establish for her future.



## Dianna Snape - Treasurer & Secretary



She attends the centre daily to teach and oversee the students and curriculum. Witnessing first-hand the challenges faced by young Tanzanian girls from disadvantaged backgrounds, Beatrice created the Inuka Tusonge Foundation with the support of its two other directors and a loan from a local women's association. Beatrice is a mother to two beautiful children. She taught our Director Dianna Snape Swahili in 2013, and they have remained friends ever since, supporting each other in their pursuit to create meaningful change for Tanzanian girls.

#### Levina Mkenda - Vice Chairperson & Treasurer

Levina holds a Bachelor of Education in English from the University of Arusha. She is a secondary teacher at Mwandeti A-level secondary school in Arusha Region. Levina also teaches Swahili to foreigners, works occasionally at the School for Internal Training (SIT) in Arusha and is the mother of two children. Occasionally she teaches English at the Inuka Tusonge Centre.

# **OUR INTERNS**




The COVID-19 pandemic that has gripped the globe throughout 2020 and into 2021 has affected every person in the world in some way, Tanzanians are no exception. One million Tanzanians are estimated to have fallen below the national poverty line since the start of the pandemic. According to a National Bureau of Statistics survey conducted in March 2021 the effects spread beyond the extremely poor: 18% of respondents who were working a year ago are no longer employed.

The pandemic has contributed to a significant decrease in incomes for those who remain employed with one in eight receiving no income at all and another 44% experiencing a decline their monthly income. Globally, women are most affected by the pandemic and have suffered more job layoffs than men in the unpredictable and changing environment. This makes the work we are doing even more important and despite these trying economic circumstances, we are proud to report that Nina Imani has managed to expand our fundraising efforts with the support of our directors, interns and donors.

We managed to raise \$16,163.46 this financial year, up from \$2,932.84 in the previous financial year – a 450% increase that speaks to the extent of our commitment as well as the support we received over the challenging past 12 months.

Fundraising from raffle ticket sales of Dianna Snape's limited edition 'Lines & Tangles' photographic prints and donations were our two most significant income streams in 2020-2021, contributing \$6780.00 and \$4302, respectively. We also received income from direct sales of Dianna's prints and Instagram fundraising efforts.


Increased fundraising has allowed us to expand the scope of our support in Tanzania. The funding we provided for our programs totalled \$13,192, compared to \$2830 in the 2020 financial year.

We are the primary sponsor of the Inuka Tusonge Foundation Vocational Centre and our donations contributed \$9781 to their operation, which equates to some 74% of our total funding. This funding supports the annual operating costs of running the centre, including rent and wages, and also facilitated the procurement of valuable assets and classroom resources such as sewing machines and an oven.

In addition, we supported Lilian Kagaruki via a study grant, covering tuition, books and safe transport to/from college. We also provided financial support while she undertook an unpaid three-month work placement in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area.



MARTIN HENG KINDLY DONATED HIS TIME TO EDIT AND ADVISE ON OUR 2020 & 2021 ANNUAL REPORT. Nina Imani is in its infancy as a charity, but our future holds a great deal of excitement, promise and opportunity to many Tanzanians in our trusted network. Our partnership with Inuka Tusonge has provided a fantastic opportunity to pursue our mission and assist in providing important vocational support for women to develop autonomy and security. While the partnership has been incredibly productive, over the next 12 months there are several goals for the expansion and improvement of the centre and the program, ideally so they can become self-sufficient and self-sustaining.

The centre's current enrolments at the end of the 2021 financial year were 15 students; however, the building has the capacity to hold 20 students. It is our vision to see the foundation operating at maximum capacity and providing the opportunities to as many young women as possible. Currently, all the women attending the centre share just four sewing machines, leading to a great deal of underutilised time. Acquiring six more sewing machines would reduce the ratio from more than seven women per machine down to two, which would lead to greater productivity, increased learning, and consequently a higher level of expertise for the graduates. Similarly, Inuka Tusonge has access to only one small oven to practise and hone their craft. The purchase of a larger oven would allow for a great deal of flexibility in learning and an increased output of goods to share with their families or sell in the village community.

We hope that our assistance to Inuka Tusonge will allow for these improvements over the next 12 months, while ultimately our goal is to fully fund the foundation. The centre currently requires funding of US\$20,000 per annum to operate at capacity and fully fund its operational expenses. The quality of its teaching staff and the support they provide is an integral part of the success of the centre. Currently, teaching staff are taking part-time salaries to work and teach within the centre and we would like to ensure they are rewarded appropriately for their work and efforts with full-time, paid employment to support the centre operating at capacity.

Looking further ahead, Inuka Tusonge has provided a great opportunity for our organisations to partner, grow and learn from one another and become knowledgeable about the requirements of operating a vocational program across continents, especially through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our longer-term goal is to purchase land and support Inuka Tusonge to build its own centre. We envision a women and girl's refuge being part of the centre to provide shelter in times of crisis and an opportunity for boarding for those students who don't have suitable or stable housing as well as childcare for women's children so that parents can attend training.

The construction and creation of our own vocational centre would provide significant opportunities and the freedom to focus directly on issues pertinent to our goals, as well as providing vital assistance to vulnerable groups. While these are ambitious targets, they will continue to be the focus for our organisation and at the heart of all our work to make a difference to the lives of many Tanzanians, both directly and indirectly.
